

Future Simple Tense

The structure of the future simple tense is: **subject** + **WILL** + **verb**

For negative sentences in the future simple tense, we use **not** between **will** verb and verb. For questions, we exchange the **subject** and **will**. For example:

	subject	WILL	(-)	verb	complement
+	I	will		<u>open</u>	<u>the door.</u>
+	You	will		<u>finish</u>	<u>before me.</u>
-	She	will	not	<u>be</u>	<u>at school tomorrow.</u>
-	We	will	not	<u>have</u>	<u>a test next Monday.</u>
?	Will	you		<u>arrive</u>	<u>on time?</u>
?	Will	they		<u>want</u>	<u>dinner?</u>

When we use the future simple tense in speaking, we often contract the subject and **will**:

I will = I'll / he will = he'll / she will = she'll / it will = it'll
you will = you'll / we will = we'll / they will = they'll

For negative sentences in the future simple tense, we contract with **won't**:

will not = won't

For example:

- Hold on. I'll **get** a pen.
- I **will see** what we can do to help you.
- Maybe we'll **stay in** and **watch** TV tonight.

- I **think** I'll go to the gym tomorrow.
- I **think** I will take physics classes next year.
- I don't **think** I'll buy that shirt.

- It **will rain** tomorrow.
- They **won't go** to Cuba this summer.

- I'll **be** in Montreal tomorrow.
- It's very funny. You **won't be** bored.
- **Will** you **be** at school tomorrow?
