Past Continuous Tense

We use the past progressive tense when:

- 1. Actions were in progress at special time in the past.
 - John was taking a nap at 3 o'clock yesterday.
 - I was eating an apple on my way home.
 - It was raining yesterday.
 - He was talking to her at recess.
- 2. Two actions were happening at the same time.
 - My sister was watching TV while I was doing my homework.
 - She was cleaning the house while he dog was sleeping.
 - My dad was making dinner while my mom was helping Sarah with her homework.
 - It was raining while we were driving to Montreal.
- 3. Together with Simple Past.
 - I was unloading the dishwasher when you called.
 - She was doing her homework when her dad came home.
 - Cedric was answering the question when the recess bell rang.
 - It was raining when I got here.

4. Repeated actions irritating the speaker

- He was always biting his nails!
- She was chewing on her pencil all the time!
- This guy was talking and talking and talking!
- It was raining all the week!

Verb Conjugation & Spelling: to be (was / were) + verb + ing

Subject	Verb	The Rest of the sentence	
I / he / she / it	was playing	soccer in the park.	
you / we / they	were studying	English at home.	

Negative Sentences in the Past Progressive/Continuous Tense to be (was / were) NOT + verb + ing:

Affirmative: You were playing tennis. Negative: You were not playing tennis.

(was not = wasn't / were not = weren't): | was not listening. = | wasn't listening. There is no difference in meaning though we normally use contractions in spoken English.

Word Order of Negative Sentences

Subject	To be + not	Verb + ing	The Rest of the sentence
I / he / she / it	wasn't	eating	mushrooms for dinner.
you / we / they	weren't	talking	about my sister.

Examples of negative sentences: John **wasn't feeling** well. / We **weren't watching** a movie. / It **wasn't raining** outside. / They **weren't playing** soccer at recess. / She **wasn't eating** peanuts.
